



# Teachers take their professional development online

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Seven teachers from the Laboratory-supported Regional Partnership School (RPS) and Math Teacher Leader Network (MTLN) gathered on a video conferencing platform April 10 to present their final projects for their Instructional Leadership in Developing Mathematical Ideas course. The course is part of a new Master's degree in Educational Leadership (with a concentration in K-8 mathematics teacher leadership), created by a partnership between New Mexico Highlands University (NMHU), Pojoaque Valley School District (PVSD), and the Laboratory's Math and Science Academy. The teachers, from public schools in Pojoaque, Española, Cuba, and Los Alamos, are on track to get their Master's in 2021.

## **Environment assessment of fiber optic line to Laboratory shows no significant impact**

The National Nuclear Security Administration (NNSA) Los Alamos Field Office has prepared the final environmental assessment (EA) report, and associated Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI) for the construction and operation of a second fiber optic line to the Laboratory and Los Alamos County. The EA analyzed the potential environmental effects that could result from the proposal that would provide redundant voice, data, and internet services. Based on the analysis in the Final EA, NNSA has determined that a FONSI is appropriate and will proceed with the proposed action to construct a second fiber optic line.
